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

#### Keynote Speaker Cameron J. Camp Ph.D.

Cameron J. Camp, Ph.D., is a noted psychologist specializing in applied gerontological research. Currently Dr. Camp serves as Director and Senior Research Scientist at Myers Research Institute/Menorah Park Center for Senior Living in Beachwood, Ohio.

Dr. Camp received his doctorate in experimental psychology form the University of Huston in 1979. For 16 years he has served in academic settings, teaching coursework in adult development and aging. He has co-authored three college textbooks and published over 100 articles in journals such as the Journal of Gerontology, The Gerontologist, Experimental Aging Research, Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders, Clinical Gerontologist, Psychology and Aging, The Journal of Clinical and Experimental Neuropsychology, and the Journal of the International Neuropsychological Society.

Dr. Camp's current research: Montessori- Based Dementia Programming uses Montessori-based activities as rehabilitative interventions for persons with dementia; "A Therapy Technique for improving memory: spaced retrieval" is an intervention that enables a therapist to apply memory improvement techniques during the course of therapy for persons with dementia; Leader Assisted Montessori Programming (LAMP) is a program that enables persons in early stage dementia to serve as group activity leaders for persons in the more advanced stages of dementia; and language boards which enable long term care staff to communicate effectively with residents who have dementia and do not speak English. These interventions are all designed to alleviate problematic behaviors and increase the level of functioning of persons with dementia.

Dr. Camp, in collaboration with HCR Manor Care, received the ASA 2004 Healthcare and Aging Award. This award designates the program <u>Disseminating Montessori-Based</u> <u>Programming to Long-Term Care Residents with Dementia</u> "as recognized for innovation and quality in healthcare and aging, 2004, American Society on Aging".

Dr. Camp is a Fellow of the Gerontological Society of America, a Fellow of the American Psychological Association, and a Charter Member of the American Psychological Society. His research is currently funded by grants from the National Alzheimer's Association, the National Institute on Aging, and the National Institute of Mental Health.
